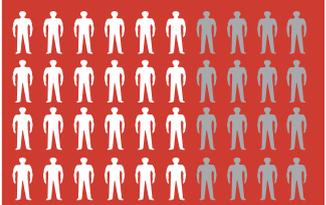
In 2016 **53%** of our imports came from the **European Union**
